The celebration of the resurrection of Jesus or in the church known as Easter. How do you explain the significance of Easter?

Since Adam and Eve had eaten from the Tree of Knowledge of Good and Evil, there has been a separation of God and mankind. What was God's first action of this decision of Adam and Eve? God went looking for Adam and Eve, an action of love. God passed judgement of their choice of disobedience and not before his admonition to the serpent. To the serpent God had said, "I will shall put enmity between you and the woman, and between your offspring and hers; it will bruise your head and you will strike its heel" NJB Genesis 3:15. When God says "strike her offspring's heel," God is foretelling of Satan's numerous attempts to defeat our Lord Jesus Christ. Yet we read that "her offspring will bruise your head," foreshadows Jesus' victory over death; it is the first glimmer of salvation.

This was the prophecy of God restoring our relationship with Him. "How we praise God,

the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who blessed with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly realms because we belong to Christ. Long ago, even before he made the world, God loved us and chose us to be holy and without fault in his eyes. His unchanging plan has always been to adopt us into his family by bringing us to himself through Jesus Christ." Ephesians 1:3-4

As we read through the Old Testament God had selected his people to be his Chosen people. Moses provided the Law to the people by which they imperfectly reconciled themselves to a Holy God. The people of Israel were not able to perfectly obey the Law, however Jesus did.

For this reason, a second Adam came, Jesus. "Though he was God, he did not demand and cling to his rights as God. He made himself nothing (and was born in the likeness of man and was found in the appearance as a man); he took the humble position of a slave and appeared in human form. And in human form He obediently humbled himself even further by dying a criminal's death on a cross bearing the sin of each of us." We are those criminals, we are separated by God because of our sin. Yet Jesus became the substitution for us and died for us on the cross bearing the penalty of sin which is death and separation from God. "And He is the propitiation for our sins: and not our sins only, but also for the sins of the whole world." 1 John 2:2 KJV.

"Because of this, God raised him up to the heights of heaven and gave him a name, a name above every other name, so that at the name of Jesus every knee shall bow, in heaven and on the earth and under the earth, and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father." Philippians 2:5-11.

Hence, the Resurrection is the cornerstone of our Christian faith and the foundation of our Christian hope and salvation.

- Named Easter Island by the Dutch explorer Jacob Roggeveen, who first spied it on Easter Day, 1722.
- Islanders use "**Rapa Nui**" when talking about their island, rather than Isla de Pascua, the name used by mainland Chileans.

Picture hanging is a specialty. He tells me he often replaces batteries for smoke detectors and also replaces light fixtures. - **Moai** are placed on a ceremonial platform called **ahus** and *almost always have their backs to the sea.* They appear to be giant heads but actually their bodies are sunk into the ground. It has been noted that the moai line up with certain stars at the time of the spring and autumn equinoxes.
- Moai are made of tuff rock from Rano Raraku quarry. If a moai accidentally broke, it was left where it fell, since it was believed that the figure's *mana* the spiritual energy that translated to its power, was gone for good.
- Until 1970, Easter Island was once the site of a US satellite tracking station because of its remote location.

Zucchini Loaves by Sally Carvalho

Ingredients

- 3 1/2 cups grated zucchini
- 3 eggs
- 1 cup oil
- 11/4 cup sugar
- 3 cups flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 teaspoons cinnamon powder
- 1 teaspoon ginger powder
- 2 teaspoons baking powder

- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 cup chopped walnuts
- 1/2 cup raisins

Method

- Preheat oven to 300 deg F.
- Line a 9"x13" baking pan or 2 loaf pans with parchment paper.
- Sieve flour, salt, spices, baking powder and baking soda together in a bowl.
- Beat eggs, sugar and oil until well mixed in another bowl.

- Combine flour mixture with the liquid mixture a little at a time adding the grated zuchinni as well until everything is well blended.
- Add walnuts and raisins.
- Bake at 300 deg F for 1 1/4 hours.
